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


The Chamber is a Champion for Progress

At our board meeting this month, as we were reviewing the progress made on our business plan in the first quarter of 2019, I was struck as to how diverse our value proposition is to our members. Yes, we talked about our workforce development programming, spent considerable time on our local and state advocacy efforts and pointed to the ways we convene our members to build relationships. But the one project that caught the attention of many in the room was the transloading facility. I'm sure many of our members don't have a clue what a transloading facility is and will never need one. That said, it is critical for our companies, mostly manufacturing related, that import materials in containers and ship them from ports via rail. With no transloading facility locally to offload the containers they have been transported all the way to Denver and shipped back via truck on Interstate 70 adding to costs and delays in getting raw materials delivered.



For many years board members and staff have heard antidotal information about how this has negatively impacted our businesses but nothing was ever done. With the support of Economic Development Partners Mesa County and City of Grand Junction the chamber staff was expanded to employ a full-time retention/expansion director, C.J. Rhyne three years ago. As he visited companies and heard this logistical complaint again and again, he determined that this was something the Chamber could do something about. He gathered the affected companies to quantify the need, gauged the potential market for this service, worked with the private sector and the railroads on infrastructure and in 18 months a problem that has plagued our business community for years has been solved.

There is more about the project elsewhere in our newsletter. A new member of our board from the manufacturing sector pointed out to the rest of us what a huge win this is at the April meeting. She admitted that in her first encounter with C.J. her question had been “what can you do for us?”. It is something we hear often from our members. For her the tangible answer comes this month with an operating transloading facility that will help her business be more competitive. The Chamber is not a static organization that hosts luncheons and business after hours. It is a catalyst for action that helps drive the improvement of our business climate and our community every single day. **So, what can we do for you?**

Toly attends Redlands Middle School, where he is a part of Student Senate. Along with being a young entrepreneur, Toly enjoys skiing, playing lacrosse, mountain biking and participating in Mesa County 4-H. His product is a protective wrap made of durable padded nylon for bike frames. Toly's product can be used on mountain bikes, road bikes, commuter bikes and BMX bikes!

In addition to being named a Saunders's Scholar, Toly was awarded \$1,000 of start-up funding from an Investor Panel composed of sponsors of the YEA! program locally.

Economic Development, Who Needs It? **We Do!**

Economic Development Week will be celebrated the week of May 6th-11th throughout the country including here in Grand Junction and Mesa County. Created in 2016 by the International Economic Development Council, an organization of 5,000 professional practitioners, the aim of this week is to draw attention to economic development and those who work diligently to aid in the creation, retention, and expansion of jobs that lead to the development of a stable tax base and the enhancement of wealth in a community.

The Grand Junction Chamber has taken the lead in this week long celebration for the past three years and will once again be promoting the benefits of economic development this year. But the Chamber is not alone. We partner with a wide variety of public and private champions of economic development in the community along with their volunteers including; the Business Incubator Center, GJEP, Industrial Developments Incorporated, Mesa County Workforce Center, Colorado Mesa University, School District 51, Career Wise Colorado, Mesa County, City of Grand Junction, Grand Junction Regional Airport, City of Fruita and the Town of Palisade to name just a few. Together we focus on business marketing, attraction, expansion and retention, workforce development, infrastructure, community development, tourism development and much more.

Here at the Chamber we have programs aimed specifically at business retention and expansion and workforce development, but the projects we work on have ramifications across multiple economic development disciplines. Our other economic development partners are also working in specific areas of business attraction, business start ups and creating an infrastructure that stimulates economic development. Job creation and creating a healthy economy is a team sport. And just like the Nuggets and the Avalanche, this community has many stars championing economic development with lots of three-point shots and hat tricks. We should be proud and we will be loud this week in pointing out the success of our efforts.

Major "Wins"

for job creation through Chamber efforts over the past year

- 1. Saving existing businesses over \$2 million annually by challenging the Grand Valley Drainage District stormwater fee in district court along with Mesa County. That is \$2 million that can be reinvested in their businesses leading to more job growth and economic wealth.**
- 2. Recognizing and celebrating the growth of existing businesses, something often overlooked in a community. In 2018-2019, 28 companies were recognized and celebrated for creating 425 new jobs and investing \$48 million in the community.**
- 3. Progress was made on establishing a regional Foreign Trade Zone with an application being accepted by the U.S. Department of Commerce and agreement by U.S. Customs and Border Protection to add a customs officer, at the area's expense, to the port of entry at the Grand Junction Regional Airport. According to the Foreign Trade Zone Corporation an organization can save up to \$200,000 annually on just Merchandise Processing Fee by being in an FTZ. Based on the initial 21 companies identified that may be able to use that zone the savings to area companies could be over \$4 million dollars annually.**
- 4. A long-standing need for local manufacturers has been access to a transloading facility that can transfer rail car containers to trucks for local and regional distribution. During ED Week we will be celebrating the opening of such a facility, coordinated by CJ Rhyne, the Chamber's Business Retention and Expansion Director. Estimated usage is between 20-100 loads per month. In addition to saving companies the time it would take to drive the cargo back from Denver to Grand Junction, the local facility could save businesses up to \$1000 per load, potentially saving local and regional companies in upwards of \$1.5 million per year.**
- 5. Advocating on behalf of local businesses with local government in matters of sign ordinances and development fees has led to a more favorable business climate. While development fees are still under discussion, changes advocated by the Chamber in the matter of the sign ordinance has been conservatively estimated to save over \$3 million.**
- 6. Workforce Development efforts have focused on current and future employees. The Chamber's Young Entrepreneurs Academy recently celebration the start up of ten new businesses with CEOs ranging in age from 11 to 18. Through the partnership with Career Wise Colorado we currently have 26 apprentices working in 22 local companies. Matchmaking between employers and local high school and college students has resulted in 40 internships and job shadows.**

Wrap Up the Legislative Session with the Chamber!

The Chamber's Annual Legislative Wrap Up is scheduled for **Tuesday, May 21st, 7:30 AM** at the Courtyard by Marriott on Horizon Drive.

Local lawmakers have been invited to attend and share their thoughts on how bills passed this session may impact businesses.

A recap of action taken by the Chamber will also be discussed including important bills such as SB19-188 and SB19-181.

A complete list of all positions taken and the outcomes of those bills will also be distributed at the breakfast.



Join the 2019/2020 **Mesa County Leadership Program**

The Grand Junction Area Chamber of Commerce championed the creation of a local leadership training program for mid to upper-level business managers over 28 years ago. The purpose of the Chamber offering such a program was to encourage business participation on boards, commissions and to be more active in public policy development, including running for public office. The focus was a holistic approach to the community with a major emphasis on how all aspects of the community come together to form a unique culture.

Since its inception over 300 individuals have graduated from the Mesa County Leadership Program. Many of them have gone on to serve on nonprofit and local government boards and serve the community in a more visible way.

Anyone interested in participating the next Mesa County Leadership Class (sponsored by Sooper Credit Union) which begins in early September is urged to submit their applications soon. The deadline is Friday, May 31st and the class is limited to 20 individuals.

Those chosen for the class will spend about one day a month in various community settings learning about what makes the community “tick” and how various sectors interact and affect other sectors. Also, included in the program is an overnight leadership retreat and attendance at the Chamber’s two-day Grand Junction trip to the state capitol in late February.

The cost is \$1,050 for the entire session including overnight trips. Our thanks to Chevron for also being a sponsor of this important program.

Grand Junction Comprehensive Plan—Get involved!

Many Chamber members have been confused and frustrated by the Colorado Department of Revenue ruling in mid-2018 that sales taxes must be collected for the jurisdictions where the product is shipped or delivered. This is known as the destination sourcing rule and is meant to stem the lack of local sales tax collections on internet sales. Unfortunately, many small retailers are ill equipped to deal with the overwhelming task of determining which of the approximately 700 taxing jurisdictions in Colorado are owed taxes.

The Grand Junction Area Chamber joined a broad coalition in requesting that implementation of the sourcing rule be delayed until May of this year so that the legislature could take up the issue. As of now, it appears that there are two bills that will become law and address the issue, offering some relief for retailers across the state.

The first is HB19-006, a Senate bill that directs the office of information technology to conduct a sourcing method for the development of a system and requiring the department of revenue to establish the implementation of such a system for the acceptance of returns and processing of payments for the sales and use tax levied by the state and any local taxing jurisdictions. The bill calls for \$10 million dollars to fund the software application this year and an additional \$8 million next year. The challenge is that the software will not be available for at least two years. That bill was passed and sent to the Governor on April 3rd.

The second bill, HB19-1240 is currently making its way through the committee process in the House and appears to be the bill that will offer relief to many small retailers around the state who ship product to their customers. In essence it: Specifies that no sales made prior to June 1 will be subject to the Department of Revenue destination sourcing rule for retailers without a physical presence

- Codifies the Department's destination sourcing rule moving forward from that date.
- Exempts retailers who sell and ship less than \$100,000 of product to Colorado customers from collecting the tax based on customer location and rather allows them to tax at the rate of their physical location until such time as the GIS based software is available which will be at least two years from now based on current estimates.
- Requires marketplace facilitators (such as Amazon) to collect and remit sales tax on behalf of marketplace sellers that enter into a contract with a marketplace facilitator that facilitates the sale of the marketplace seller's tangible personal property, commodities, or services through the marketplace facilitator's marketplace

With just two weeks left in the Legislative Session we do expect this bill to begin moving fairly quickly and, as it has throughout this process, the Chamber will continue to advocate for a solution to this rule that works for our small businesses.
